

# HISTORICAL CLUB GETS CITY MINUTES

## John P. Wall Reports the Work of Printing Minutes from 1790- 1819 Completed-Dr. Raven Made Vice-President.

At the business meeting of the New Brunswick Historical club held last night J. P. Wall, chairman of the committee on printing the minutes of the city of New Brunswick from 1790 to 1819 reported that the work had been completed and had been compared and found to be accurate.

The work was in his opinion not only a credit to the club but an invaluable benefit to the city as the copies would be kept in various places and the minutes of New Brunswick in its infancy could not be lost in case of fire. Mr. Noyes had done the first 50 pages and the rest by Miss Vandivert at a total cost of \$2.

He suggested that in the of the minutes all of which between 1830-32 were intact taken instead of copying. Mr. Wall said that one set turned over to the city clerk, one set to the original copy in the archives of the club, one set to the New Jersey State Historical Society, one set to the public library, and a third sent to the public library. 



Mr. A. A. Marcelus presenten a map of the city to common council, whereupon it was ordered that the Mayor presen the thanks of common council to Mr, Marcilus for the same.

Resolved: That the Clerk be dericted to cause the ordinance to prevent the firing of guns ~~withintine~~ within the line of buildings in this city, to be published in the papers printed in this ciyy, immediatly preceding and suceding the 4th of July.

July 24. 1829.

Resolved: <sup>the</sup> ~~5ht~~ the field or lot, called Potters Field, be leased to David <sup>Mercereau</sup> ~~MERREAU~~ from the present period to the first day of April 1834, in consideration that the said Mercereau shall during that time , keep the said lot in good and lawful fence, and shall cultivate the same in a husbandmanlike manner; and in further consideration, that at the experation of ~~suchx~~ said time, he shall redeliver the said lot, in good fence, and properly laid down in good timity grass, and that the said David Mercereau do prepare the necessary papers and present them to the Mayor for his signature on or before the tenth day of September next.

Nicholas Booraem was appointed City Assor and Abraham S. Van Dursen was appointed City Collector, for the ensuing year.

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August 29, 1829.

Resolved: That a committee be appointed to take into consideration the propriety of regulating the burial of the dead, and of purchasing a hearse, and fixing a certain rates for the use of the same, within the bounds of this Corporation.

Mesers. Kirkpatrick, Voorhees and Conover were appointed said committee.

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November 14, 1829.

Jacob R. Hardenberg produced his oath of office as Mayor of the City of New Brunswick .

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November 27, 1829.

Mr. Freeman tendered his resignation as a member of this Board which was accepted, and the Mayor instructed to call a special election, to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of B. M. Voorhees and M. F. Freeman.

December 11, 1829.

Abraham S. Neilson and Mahlon S. Clark were elected to Council to fill the vacancies caused by the resignations of Borden M. Voorhees and Matthias F. Freeman.

The committee on Hearse reported that they had examined a hearse made by Mr. <sup>Aaron</sup> Hassart- the one now belonging to Mr. Hassert, the committee found to be in perfect order; it is not new, the carriage part being somewhat worn; but it has suffered but little injury. This hearse can be purchased for the sum of eighty dollars, and such arrangements can be made as to give in part payment, a Ladder Waggon, which is of no use to the city.

Resolved: That the hearse be purchased and the Ladder Waggon given in part payment. ( It was not purchased)

Resolved: That \$ 500.00, be appropriated to the Hall Fund for the education of poor children in this city.

---

December 23, 1829.

Mr. William Lupp offered to keep the two town clocks in order for the sum of \$ 50.00, per year, Samuel Baker and Haley Fiske offered to perform the same services for \$ 40.00, per year.

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January 22, 1830,

An account was presented from Joseph Brewer for services rendered on getting persons indicted for selling ardent spirits without license - which was laid over until next meeting.

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March 12, 1830,

Apetition was presented from the owners of property and residents of King and Queen streets, praying that the names of said streets may be done away, and setting forth that as one street is but the continuation of the other, the two may have but one name- and reccomend Columbia or ~~some~~ such other name as the board may deem proper.

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March 26, 1830.

The names of King , Queen and Prince streets were regularly changed by ordinance . The street committee were instructed to change the signes on King and Queen streets to that of Neilson, and that of Prince to Bayard street.

The committee to which was committed , are of the opinion that common council are under no leagal obligation to assume the charge of keeping in repair the public pumps of the city, yet, as it is important both for the convenience of the citizens and the security of the city in case of fire, that the same should be kept in good repair, and as the burden of such expense and repairs are very unequally divided, whilst the advantages derived are general and common to all, they therefore believe it will be expedient for common council to take in charge all the public pumps withen the line of buildings in the city, and keep the same in repair, and recomend that an inspection of the pumps be made and all necessary repairs be made at the expense of the Corporation

Mr. Neilson, from the committee appointed to procure a building for the detintion of such strangers as may be attacked with cholera, and not otherwise provided for, Reported, that they had procured the house at present occupied ( and owned ) by a free man of color, commonly known by the name of John or Jack Cambell, for which they have agreed to pay the said Campbell the sum of thirty dollars from the present time until the first day of November next. They would therefore offer the following resolutions; viz:

That the chairman of this committee be authorized to draw upon the Treasury for ten dollars , and on the first day of October next for a further sum of twenty dollars - these being the terms agreed upon between your committee and the said Campbell.

Report adopted.

July 9, 1832.

Resolved: That William H. Lupp be appointed attorney for the Corporation.

---

July 23, 1832,

Resolved: That the Mayor, or in his absence, the Recorder, be authorized to issue a placard informing such poor and indigent persons residing in the city, who may be attacked with cholera, or have the premonitory symptoms, and have not the means to obtain medical aid or assistance, to call upon any practising physician in the city for such assistance, and that the bills so contracted, be paid by Common Council.

The first standing committees on Streets, Poor, Finance and other matters were appointed in 1825. Previous to this time all matters were attended to by special committees appointed by the Mayor who was the Presiding officier or what was known then as Moderator.

\*\*\*\*\*

In this year a particular intrest was taken in the improvement of the streets, petitions were presented for the laying and improvement of the walks and gutters on Church, Peace, Burmett, ~~W~~ Water and Hynam streets. One element of the ~~propert~~ property owners opposed the same and after a very bitter contest were beaten and the improvements made.

\*\*\*\*\*

Complaints were made about the pool pf stagnant water at the corner of Washington and King streets , also of the open drain in French (Albany) street, as well as the culvert on Church above George street.

\*\*\*\*\*

The culvert on Church street, above George strees caused trouble on account of not being of suffecient size to carry of the water,.

\*\*\*\*\*

There was a general coplaint of the poor condition and unsanitary state of the Barrack stream, Also of the hogs that were kept by the owners of the distillery as well as complaint being made against the manure heap which was in the distelley yard.

\*\*\*\*\*

John W. Bray asked permission to lay logs across the gully at the foot of Frengh street (Albany) near the bridge.

\*\*\*\*\*

The Boat company were notified in 1832 to have the dock and the approach to the same filled up to avoid an accident.

\*\*\*\*\*

The average amount assesed for Tavern license was \$ 15.00.

\*\*\*\*\*

Corneilus Van Derbelt held license for five years -

Somerset street was laid put in 1823.

\*\*\*\*\*

The city officiers included a City Paver, a City Leveler, a re-packer of beef, a tester of liquor, an inspector of bread, an inspector of planks and lumber, and other minor officiels.
